23<sup>rd</sup>: I have a friend who... *gossips.*

March

2<sup>nd</sup>: I have a friend who... *is depressed.*

5<sup>th</sup> (Ash Wednesday): I have a friend who... *is going to die.*

I believe that these are more than just sermon topics; they represent real lives, real struggles, and real opportunities to reflect Christ's love. Through this series, we'll learn how to speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15) and walk alongside others with humility and hope.

### Winter Discipleship Study

This winter, we will engage in a 4-week study by retired UMC Bishop William Willimon, *Fear of the Other: No Fear in Love*.

We will meet for an hour in Fellowship Hall immediately following the 2<sup>nd</sup> service on January 26, February 2, 16, and 23 (we'll skip Super Bowl Sunday, 2/9).

Willimon brings a Wesleyan perspective to what is often a hard thing to do: love the "other" without needing them to become like us.

In the introduction, Willimon writes,

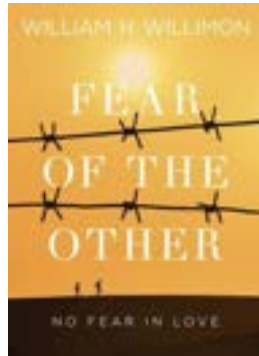
*"Let the politicians do what they must to be elected... My job is not to worry about opinion polls or to debate national strategy. My peculiar vocation is to help the church think like Christians so that we might be given the grace to act like Jesus."*

Each week, we'll watch and discuss a conversation between Willimon and Dalia Cataline Ramirez, the deputy director of the Community Renewal Society, on the challenges of a xenophobic world, our natural fears, and the gospel promise of inclusion.

Of this study, Pastor Adam Hamilton writes, "Will writes with prophetic sarcasm, a touch of humor, and a pastor's heart. His words will make you laugh, cringe, cry, confess, and repent."

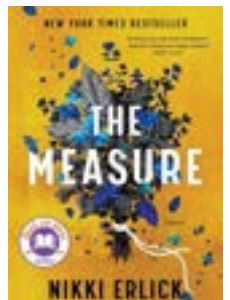

## GREEN RESOLUTIONS FOR JANUARY

**WE CAN renew our commitment to be good stewards** of our Earth. Choose one *new* thing to do throughout the year to care for creation.

**WE CAN clean up.** Review your closets for items to donate for reuse, to repurpose, or to recycle. Challenge your family to avoid letting anything go to the landfill by donating it for someone else to use.

**WE CAN consume less meat.** Explore the options for foods that are kinder to earth and to health. What we eat does have an impact on nature and climate change, as well as our own bodies. Host a meatless potluck and invite people to share their recipes.

**WE CAN avoid single-use plastics.** Take your own reusable bags when shopping. When eating out, bring your own take-home container. Substitute bamboo, silicon, cloth from natural fibers, glass, or aluminum products for plastic ones.

**WE CAN support creation justice efforts.** Help fund organizations that care for the environment and for communities that are vulnerable. They can gather resources and amass power that creates greater impact than individuals can.

**WE CAN reduce greenhouse gas emissions.** Minimize the use of paper, which comes from chopping down trees. Choose instead email, texting, recycled paper, or reusable scrap paper. Change to bamboo toilet tissue that spares trees so they can continue to reduce carbon dioxide in the atmosphere.



## SOLAR UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

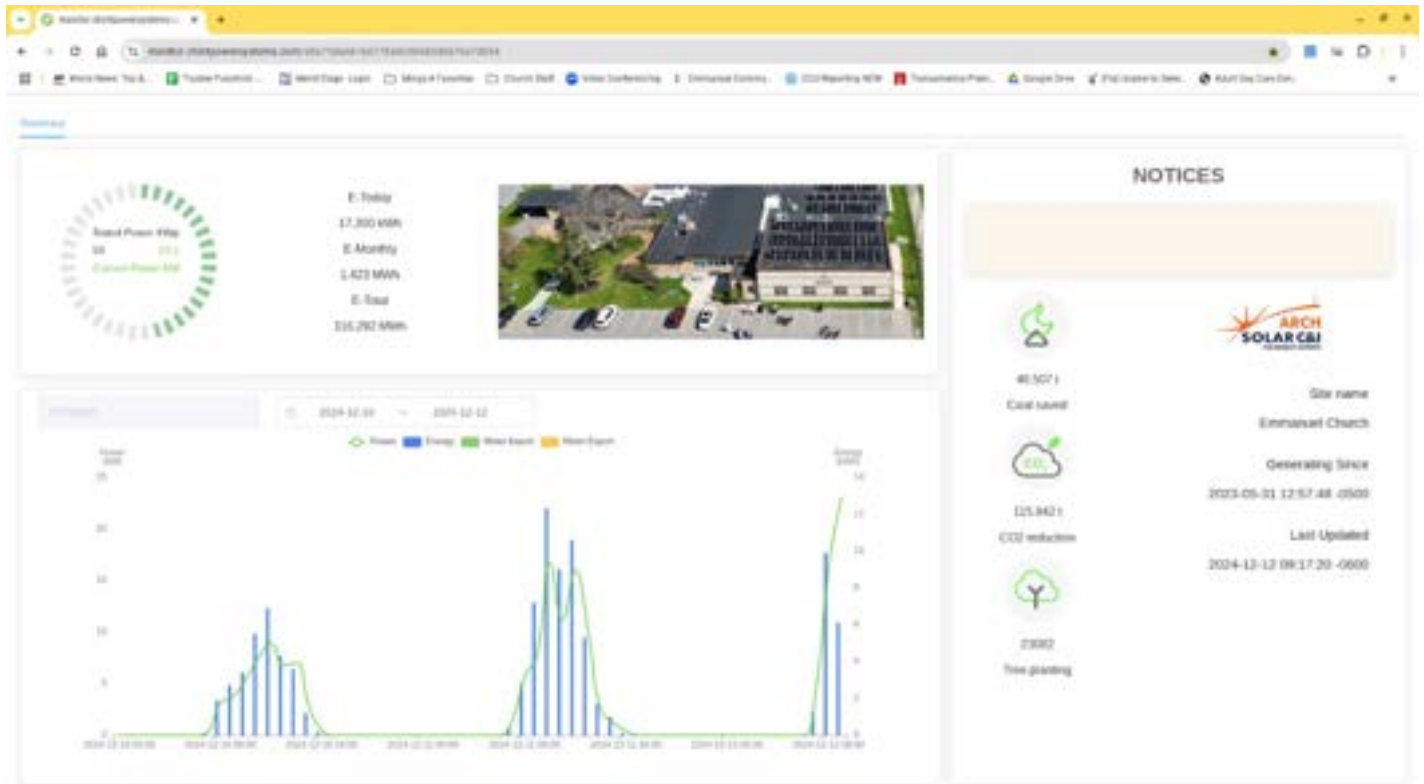
So you look at your thermometer this morning and see it reads -5 degrees! OUCH, that is cold. Then you remember that up on the roof at church we have 118 solar panels working for us today. You smile, knowing that even in cold weather, they produce over 20kw from our sun daily!

Thank you, God for your gift of sunshine!

Below is a snapshot from one day's solar plant that we have working for us here at Emmanuel.

This report shows that the energy we have produced equals planting 23,000 trees to remove the same amount of pollution through photosynthesis. We have reduced CO2 emissions by 115 tons (230,000 pounds of carbon dioxide gas)!

Every day our solar panels produce savings for us, but we still have a financial comment to pay them off.



The commitment we made for our Solar project was to “pay it off” in the next 5 years.

As of December 31, 2024, we have made the first two years of payments (2 X \$7,250 = \$14,300), which leaves us with three more years to complete our payments for these panels.

We have just about used the previous donations from church members and could use your help in replenishing the funding for this project.

If your heart is so inclined to share in this project, please donate and write “Solar Project” in the notes section of your payment method. God blesses us each day with opportunities to help us save the earth!

## A STEWARDSHIP STORY

### Giving - It's More than Gifts

*They offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road. (Matthew 2:11)*

Judy and Doug looked at each other and instantly knew what the other was thinking. *It's the second Sunday in January. Where was everyone who came to Christmas Eve services?*

Judy put her hands together and whispered, "Here's the church, here's the steeple, open the door, where are the people?"



On the way home Doug remembered, "It was so exciting to go to church last month. The pews were full and we had kids singing, adults singing and instrumentalists playing at every service. I got so caught up I agreed to serve on the finance committee when they asked! What was I thinking? Now we're singing 'In the Bleak Midwinter,' there's plenty of room in the pews and the offering plates have almost nothing in them."

Judy drove in silence and let him vent. As they sat down for their pizza playoff lunch before the game she said, "Remember what Pastor Matt said about the fact that the story didn't end when the wise men gave their gifts. They heard that Herod wanted to kill the child so they went home via another route so that they could tell everyone what they'd seen. When the wise men arrived at the stable, their journey wasn't over. In fact, it had just begun. Our journey is about a lot more than going to church -- it's about helping people know how Jesus can change their lives for the better and inviting them to join us."

Doug had to agree with her. At halftime he suggested they sit down and make a list of the people they missed seeing in worship and figure out when the two of them might call or email them before the next Sunday's service.

## MINUTES OF ECUMC CHURCH CONFERENCE WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 11, 2024

Meeting was called to order at 7:25 PM by Rev John Sumwalt  
Together the assembly reaffirmed our mission statement of *Imitating Christ Together*.

### Presiding Elder's Reflections:

Rev Sumwalt reviewed updates from the General Conference that happened in May of this year. The conference addressed issues around homosexuality and the United Methodist Church's stance on this. He also reviewed the new regional organization, WI is now aligned with Northern Illinois and our new Bishop is Dan Schwerin. The regionalization also allows for global regions, so United Methodists worldwide can have different stances on key issues.



Lastly, he read aloud a Resolution of Repentance that was drafted at the conference:

On May 3, 2024 the General Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Charlotte, North Carolina, passed a resolution of apology to survivors of clergy sexual abuse and their families.

The Resolution of Repentance reads as follows:

"The United Methodist Church apologizes for the times we allowed our desire to protect the Church to outweigh our desire to care for victims and survivors of sexual misconduct. We have allowed polity and protection of the institutional Church to prevent us from holding persons accountable, thus perpetuating harm within our local churches and other ministry settings, and damaging the whole United Methodist connection.

We apologize for the times we have not listened to you, doubted your stories, ignored your wounds, and have not tended to your pain. We believe this has contributed to allowing an unsafe culture to exist. An apology is worthless without a commitment to the challenging work which must follow.

The United Methodist Church pledges to:

1. Apologize in every annual conference across the connection.
2. Educate Church leaders regarding sacred trust in ministerial relationships and power imbalance within those relationships.
3. Provide healing resources to all affected in accordance with Complaint Procedures.
4. Develop a trauma-informed response to complaints of sexual misconduct.

This apology alone is insufficient for healing. The United Methodist Church accepts our responsibility and publicly states our commitment to carry out the steps named to do no more harm. May God's blessing and never-ending love guide our work and see it through."

Not only was the apology statement read in its entirety during General Conference, but all United Methodist bishops around the world are to read the apology at their own upcoming annual conferences.

### Ministry Review:

All those present were provided with a packet of reports from staff, ministry teams and administrative teams. No questions were raised on these reports.

### Actions Requiring a Vote:

Lay leadership (nominations) report presented by Rollin Kring was reviewed, amended as needed and approved unanimously.

Pastoral Compensation for 2025, including Accountable Reimbursement and Housing or Furnishings Allowance was presented by SPRC chair Peg Heinen and was approved unanimously.

Pastor Matt discussed Call and Servant leadership, encouraging anyone stirred to explore ministry to talk with him. He also will contact Garrett Seminary regarding the status of a scholarship from our congregation that was previously established.

Membership Roster was reviewed regarding members who have passed away in the last year and other active members who have requested to be withdrawn from the church rolls.

The proposed 2025 budget was presented by Anne Weiland, with the acknowledgment that it is a fluid document subject to revision by the church council. It was unanimously approved.

**Adjournment:** Rev Sumwalt adjourned the meeting at 7:48 PM.
